Our clergy regularly baptise new members of the church, preside at weddings and care for the grieving through our funeral ministry.

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

THE FIRST READING Jeremiah 1:4-10 read by Brenda Mouritz

Now the word of the Lord came to me saying, "Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, and before you were born I consecrated you; I appointed you a prophet to the nations." Then I said, "Ah, Lord God! Truly I do not know how to speak, for I am only a boy." But the Lord said to me, "Do not say, 'I am only a boy,' for you shall go to all to whom I send you, and you shall speak whatever I command you. Do not be afraid of them, for I am with you to deliver you, says the Lord." Then the Lord put out his hand and touched my mouth, and the Lord said to me, "Now I have put my words in your mouth. See, today I appoint you over nations and over kingdoms, to pluck up and to pull down, to destroy and to overthrow, to build and to plant."

THE SECOND READING Romans 4.13-22 read by Ted Mouritz

For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. For if it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. For the law brings wrath, but where there is no law, neither is there transgression. For this reason the promise depends on faith, in order that it may rest on grace, so that it may be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (who is the father of all of us, as it is written, "I have made you the father of many nations"), in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist. Hoping against hope, he believed that he would become "the father of many nations," according to what was said, "So shall your descendants be." He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was already as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), and the barrenness of Sarah's womb. No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised. Therefore "it was reckoned to him as righteousness."

THE GOSPEL Luke 1.5-25

The Lord be with you. And also with you.

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to St. Luke. **Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.**

In the days of King Herod of Judea, there was a priest named Zechariah, who belonged to the priestly order of Abijah. His wife was descended from the daughters of Aaron, and her name was Elizabeth. Both of them were righteous before God, living blamelessly according to all the commandments and regulations of the Lord. But they had no children because Elizabeth was barren, and both were getting on in years. Once when he was serving as priest before God during his section's turn of duty, he was chosen by lot, according to the custom of the priesthood, to enter the sanctuary of the Lord to offer incense. Now at the time of the incense offering, the whole assembly of the people was praying outside. Then there appeared to him an angel of the Lord, standing at the right side of the altar of incense. When Zechariah saw him, he was terrified, and fear overwhelmed him. But the angel said to him, "Do not be afraid, Zechariah, for your prayer has been heard. Your wife Elizabeth will bear you a son, and you will name him John. You will have joy and gladness, and many will rejoice at his birth, for he will be great in the sight of the Lord. He must never drink wine or strong drink; even before his birth he will be filled with the Holy Spirit. He will turn many of the people of Israel to the Lord their God. With the spirit and power of Elijah he will go before him, to turn the hearts of parents to their children and the disobedient to the wisdom of the righteous, to make ready a people prepared for the Lord." Zechariah said to the angel, "How can I know that this will happen? For I am an old man, and my wife is getting on in years." The angel replied, "I am Gabriel. I stand in the presence of God, and I have been sent to speak to you and to bring you this good news. But now, because you did not believe my words, which will be fulfilled in their time, you will become mute, unable to speak, until the day these things occur." Meanwhile the people were waiting for Zechariah and wondering at his delay in the sanctuary. When he did come out, he was unable to speak to them, and they realised that he had seen a vision in the sanctuary. He kept motioning to them and remained unable to speak. When his time of service was ended, he returned to his home. After those days his wife Elizabeth conceived, and for five months she remained in seclusion. She said, "This is what the Lord has done for me in this time, when he looked favourably on me and took away the disgrace I have endured among my people."

THE SERMON The Revd Dr Aaron Ghiloni, Assistant Curate, St. George's, Malvern




and for time together with our animals. Refreshments will be served. Please do sign up to assist with the success of this day, with a sign-up sheet available in the narthex.

Jeremiah 1:4-10

The people of Israel have strayed from God's ways. In the late 600s BC, King Josiah guided the people back to godliness by removing all traces of foreign worship and by making Jerusalem the one place of worship. Jeremiah played a key role in Josiah's reforms. "The word of the LORD" is a characteristic expression in this book: the message Jeremiah proclaims is God's word. The Hebrew word yashar, translated "formed" (v. 5), is a technical term for *created*; a potter forms clay into pottery. Recall Genesis 2:7-8, where God forms man. The idea that God himself forms a child in its mother's "womb" (v. 5) was accepted. God has known Jeremiah since his first moment of existence - both intellectually and in his capacity for action. Even before that, God dedicated him, separated him for his purposes ("consecrated"), to serve him. Jeremiah is but a youth ("boy", v. 6 – probably in his early twenties), without experience and authority, but God will give him all necessary support. (Moses' reaction to God's command to lead the people of Israel was similar.) God commissions Jeremiah through the symbolic action of touching his mouth (v. 9). In vv. 5 and 10, the "nations" and "kingdoms" are most likely Assyria, Babylonia, Egypt and Judah: the history of Israel is intertwined with that of the whole Near East. Jeremiah's mission is to do away with corruption and ungodliness, and to promote ethical conduct and godliness. God's instructions to the prophet continue in v. 17. Jeremiah is to be ready for action ("gird up your loins"); he is to respond promptly to God's commands. Mighty as the ungodly are, he is not to flinch, but to "stand up" to them; if he fails to do so, God will "break" him. Even though the deviants will fight against him and persecute him, he will prevail, "for I am with you ... to deliver you" (v. 19).

Psalm 71:1-6


The psalmist finds sanctuary in his trust in God; even so, he asks God to be his reference point ("rock", v. 3) and strength in life, to rescue him from "cruel" (v. 4) and ungodly people. He has trusted in God since his youth (v. 5) and, as v. 18 shows, he is now in "old age" and has "grey hairs". God has supported him throughout his life ("from my birth", v. 6). Note the belief that God caused him to be born.

Romans 4:13-22

In Chapters 2 and 3, Paul has argued that through the gospel, it is faith that brings humans into harmony with God. Now he considers Abraham as an example. At the time, rabbis argued that God's blessings came to Abraham because he kept Mosaic Law (which, they said, he knew in advance – before Moses received the tablets on Mount Sinai.) In v. 13, Paul argues against this rabbinic lore: Abraham was blessed because he believed, had faith, that he would be father of a nation and a source of blessing for "all … families" (Genesis 12:3). If only those who keep Mosaic Law are God's people, faith is meaningless ("null", v. 14) and God's "promise" of universal godliness is nonsense - because the Law is a contract; in a contract, each party has responsibilities, each knows what he will receive (e.g. "wages", v. 4), but a promise is a gift, and is therefore an object of faith: faith that what is promised will be received. Paul now notes: because we all deviate from God's ways at times, sinning does happen. For those under the Law, a penalty (God's "wrath", v. 15) ensues, but for us, not living under the Law ("no law"), there is no contract to violate. Paul now returns to his main argument: so rather than the human relationship being legally based, "it depends on faith" (v. 16), on God's freely given gift of love ("grace"). Were it legally based, continually breaking the pact would make a nonsense of it, but being faith-based, the relationship is "guaranteed" to all peoples in every age – not just to Jews but also to others. Per Genesis 17:5, Abraham is spiritual father of us all (v. 17). Sarah's bearing of Isaac when beyond child-bearing age ("gives life to the dead") was due to his faith; it had been promised to him by God. Isaac was called into existence. So Abraham is a model for the Christian. Contrary to expectation, in hope ("Hoping against hope", v. 18) he believed. He had every reason to doubt that he would become a father, but believe he did – because of the hope given by God's promise – in God's creative power. Abraham's faith grew stronger as he thanked God for his gift ("gave glory to God", v. 20). He attained a right relationship with God ("was reckoned to him as righteousness", v. 22). Our faith in God's promises will also be considered worthy by God when Christ comes again ("our justification", v. 25).

ANTHEM Jesu, the very thought of thee

Edward Bairstow was born in Huddersfield. Even as a young child he showed interest in music and felt that he had been born with 'a sense of message'. After some disjointed early music lessons, he was taught more formally by John Farmer, and later by Sir Frederick Bridge, organist of Westminster Abbey. He also acknowledged a debt to Sir Walter Alcock, who was sub-organist at the time. *Jesu, the very thought of thee* is one of three unaccompanied anthems written in 1925. There are some telling tenutos at the word 'thought' and some warm harmonies as the work progresses. The strongest moment, using a seventh chord, comes at 'thy face to see', after which there is a gradual diminuendo towards peace and repose.

MOTET Give almes of thy goods

Christopher Tye has been called an "innovator" of English cathedral music that was "perfected" by Thomas Tallis, William Byrd and Orlando Gibbons. Tye and Tallis bridged the musical and liturgical styles from Roman to Anglican in the earliest days of the English Church in the mid-16th Century. He worked closely with Edward VI, the young monarch who called Tye "our musical lecturer." Moving away from Roman plainsong chant, Edward VI had decreed that choirs sing in English and with only one note to every syllable. The beauty and effectiveness of Dr. Tye's short anthem *Give almes of thy goods* is its simplicity and imitative voice parts. One vocal line leads as all the others follow, woven together like fine fabric. Listen for the words "and then the face" as they culminate in sublime, homophonic chordal treatment of the text "shall not be turned away from thee."

ART COMMENTARY

Alexander Andreyevich Ivanov was a Russian painter who adhered to the waning tradition of Neoclassicism but found little sympathy with his contemporaries. The painting by Ivanov on the cover of today's pewsheet, *The Angel Appears to Zechariah*, depicts the story from today's gospel, the angel Gabriel telling Zechariah that his wife Elizabeth, is with child. As we know from the gospel, this news comes as quite a shock to Zechariah, as he and Elizabeth are both old and childless - they had long presumed Elizabeth was barren! Both had been devout and steadfast in their devotion to God and while they longed for a child they did not anticipate this gift. The seven-branched candelabrum in the background of the painting indicates Zechariah's position as a priest.

The painting itself is actually one of several sketches done with pencil and watercolour in preparation for a much larger fresco Ivanov had intended to paint.
